Extra trains have been laid on to provide additional capacity at key venues, while keeping the regular timetable running for the people of the West Midlands.

Throughout the Games, more than 100 extra WMT staff will be at stations to keep passengers moving.

Ben Roberts, head of Commonwealth Games at WMT said: "I have been so impressed with the enthusiasm within the business and I am confident we can play our part in making the Games a huge success."

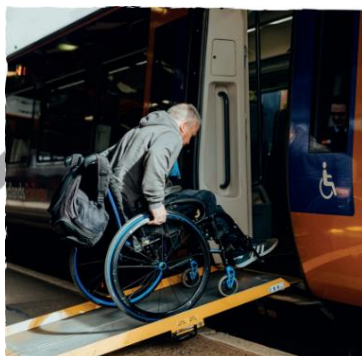

New guide introduced



Accessibility Matters



A new Customer Accessibility Guide to support accessible travel at WMT is being created.

This guide was piloted at a Perry Barr open day/launch event in July and will be presented to our Stakeholder Equality Group for further feedback; it will be available digitally and printed to suit a range of requirements, with an estimated launch date of September.

The leaflet provides an overview of the ways in which we seek to make the railway a more accessible and inclusive place for disabled customers and colleagues. Around 70 million rail journeys are made by disabled people each year across the rail network. One million of these require assistance to be provided.

We want to give passengers the confidence to use our services and have the information required to make a journey with peace of mind.

We recognise that not all impairments are visible and not everyone wishes to identify as disabled. However, we provide an accessible service to all our customers and seek to break down barriers that disabled people may be facing when travelling by train.

Emma said: "It was an honour to be nominated and to carry the baton with my assistance dog Luna by my side. "It is amazing to be a part of this historical event. My daughter is three and doesn't understand but I can't wait to share the stories and photos from Saturday with her as she grows older – she followed alongside my route cheering for me which was unforgettable."

Bedford River Festival

Additional services introduced



London Northwestern Railway ran extra trains for spectators attending the popular Bedford River Festival.

Up to 250,000 people attended the event on Saturday 23 July and Sunday 24 July, with increased demand for public transport anticipated as a result.

LNR arranged for special train services to run on the Marston Vale Line, between Bedford and Bletchley, across the weekend.

An extra late-night service departed Bedford at 11.10pm on the Saturday. On the Sunday, six round trips were introduced on the Marston Vale Line, between 10.15am and 5.50pm.

Trent Valley closed

Route shut for engineering work

Network Rail engineering works will result in the closure of the Trent Valley for a full week in October and a number of Sundays.

The work will take place between 22-30 October, meaning West Coast Main Line services will not be able to call at Trent Valley stations.

Closures will also take places on Sunday 16 October, Sunday 5 November, Sunday 12 November and Sunday 19 November. Affected routes:

- Crewe – London Euston (services are expected to start/terminate at Rugby), with buses running between Rugby – Stafford
- Birmingham – Rugeley (services are expected to start/terminate at Hednesford), with buses running between Hednesford – Rugeley
- Nuneaton – Coventry (services are expected to start/terminate at Bermuda Park), buses running between Bermuda Park – Nuneaton (This applies to the Saturday and Sundays only).

Community projects

Funding for 20+ schemes



More than 20 community projects across the West Midlands Trains network have been given the green light following a grant from the operators.

The schemes have been given the go-ahead by WMR and LNR through the 2022/2023 Customer & Communities Improvement Fund.

Some of these projects include:

- Pop Up health and wellbeing hubs at inner-city stations.
- City & Guilds qualification for young station adopters at Wythall station.
- Reducing loneliness and social isolation in the community close to Hartford Station
- Continued support for the Night Shelter in Milton Keynes which addresses the homelessness near the train station.
- Free childcare activities for disadvantaged parts of the Northampton community during school holidays.

The CCIF programme supports projects that have a local/regional benefit, improve local community facilities, address areas of social need, enhance the passenger experience across the network and help to regenerate the places and communities we serve.

Members of the ASLEF and RMT trade unions have announced dates for industrial action in August.

RMT members have announced their intention to stage strike action on Thursday 18 August and Saturday 20 August.
